Waltraud Deeg



Sandra Bonfiglioli

Graduated in Mathematics and Physics, full professor of Territorial and Urban Planning at Politecnico di Milano (Polimi), teaches Mathematical Analysis in Engineering and Analysis of Urban Systems in Architecture. In the 1970s she directed the Institute of Mathematics at the Faculty of Architecture; in the 1980s she founded LabSat for Time Oriented Urbanism (T/Urb) research prompted by the Italian movement “Le donne cambiano i tempi”; in the period 1992-1994 she drafted with others at the Milan City Council the first Milan Time Plan; in 2002 she directed the Architettura-Polimi establishment in the Piacenza campus and the Urban Planning Lab of Times and Mobility; she was a consultant to the Municipality of Bolzano for about twenty years to set up the Times Office and to train staff for projects on “New City Times for Quality of Life”; she consulted Italian municipalities and regions for the drafting of national law no. 53 of 8 March 2000 and some regional laws including that of Lombardy (LR no. 28 of 28 October 2004).



Jean-Yves Boulin

Sociologist in the field of work, employment, industrial relations and time (seen in its different social dimensions). Since 1980, he studied time issues at a national and international level, their impact on labour organization, working conditions and work-life balance. The main activities have been comparative analysis and researches. During the last 20 years, he also focused on Local Time Policies and Social Organization of Time. In this capacity, he has been scientific director of a Prospective DATAR's (Délégation à l'Aménagement du Territoire et à l'Action Régionale) seminar on ‘Time and Territories’ from 2000 to 2003. He is currently involved in several international networks, as a member of the Expert Lab monitored by Barcelona Time Use Initiative, expert of the research group monitored by French Association Nationale pour la Santé et la Sécurité au Travail (ANSES) on “unsocial working hours” (2021-2023) and member of editorial committees of several journals. He is an associate researcher at Paris Dauphine University and Vice President of Tempo Territorial, a French association which gathers local authorities involved in time policies. He is also monitoring the European Network of Cities Involved in Local Time Policies.



Ulrich Mückenberger

From 1985 to 2010 Ulrich Mückenberger held a chair for labour and European law and European governance at the university of Hamburg. He served as a guest professor at the universities of London, Bari, Florence, Nantes, Chicago, Shanghai and St. Petersburg. He directed the German school of Eurexter and the Time-Lab, first German time policy-research institute. He was co-founder of the German Society for Time Policy. As an emeritus, he has been a research professor at the Centre for European Law and Policy in Bremen. He co-elaborated the Collaborative Research Centre (DFG-Sfb 1342) “Global Dynamics of Social Policy” directing the project “Worlds of Labour. Normative Standards of Employment Relationships as National and Global Patterns of Welfare State Development.”



Marta Junque Surià

Mother, activist, and consultant committed to find a better balance between on time uses to improve everybody's life. Currently, Marta is the co-coordinator of the Barcelona Time Use Initiative for a Healthy Society, the main European association promoting time policies. Since 2021, she has been elected secretary of the Network of Local and Regional Governments for Time Policies and member of the Executive Board of the International Association for Time Use Research. Recently, she has assessed the Spanish Government on the future law of time use.

Previously, she worked for 10 years as Public Sector consultant, for international and local organisations, while being activist in different European NGOs. In 2019, she decided to “slow down and live a more balanced life, not just working” and from then on, she has become a key activist for time policies and right to time, for everyone.

Giacomo Angeloni

Giacomo Angeloni is the city councillor for innovation, simplification, demographic services, multifunctional counter, urban times, cemetery services, participation and neighborhood networks of the Municipality of Bergamo. Since his youth, he has been politically and socially engaged. He as a social worker first in the Migrantes cooperative and then in the Diakonia onlus association. Angeloni joined the city council in 2009, from the ranks of the Democratic Party. After that, he became a member of the city cabinet in 2014 after the election of Mayor Giorgio Gori, and was confirmed for a second term in 2019. He has always been active on time policies. In fact, he participated in the establishment of the City Time

Policies Commission, which he now chairs. The Commission, in addition to managing the Bergamo's Territorial Time Policies Plan, activates initiatives on urban time policies, also creating synergies between public and private subjects, and draws up proposals on the subject of competence.



Núria Vergés Bosch

During the 2016-2021 term, as an opposition councillor, she focused on human rights, reducing inequalities, environmental policies and access to housing as a basic right. In 2021 she was re-elected city councillor obtaining the most votes out of all candidates of all parties running in the city election with the platform Coalizione Civica Coraggiosa Ecologista e Solidale and was appointed Statutory Vice Mayor and Deputy Mayor in charge of Housing, Climate Assemblies and Climate Office, Night Economy, Equal Opportunities and Anti Discrimination Policies.

Markus Frewein


